A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL


At the beginning of each year I always find it interesting to speak with our newly arrived Year 7 students. They are always highly energetic and enthusiastic and very positive about their new school.

Our school would like to acknowledge the support of Club Marconi. For many years they have sponsored our school with Driving School lessons for our senior students. Each Friday a car and a driver are provided to the school and senior students are given free driving lessons.

Students must nominate for these lessons. Year 11 are currently receiving the lessons. Those students who

are successful in receiving lessons have a record of positive behaviour and contribution to the school programs and school life. They hand in recognition

awards, complete all set work and assignments on time and have a record of exemplary behaviour here at school.

We also wish to express our gratitude and thanks for the ongoing and continued support for our students and our educational programs from the John Edmondson VC Memorial Club (Club Liverpool). In 2013 our school applied for two Clubs NSW Grants. We are pleased to say we were successful in receiving both of these grants.

Our first grant contributed to the funding of our after-school Homework Centre. This operates in the school library on Monday and Thursday afternoons. The grant was used to assist with staffing the Centre. This grant allowed us to employ two teachers each afternoon for a total of twenty five weeks. The students attending struggle with their learning and greatly benefitted from the opportunity to bring along homework, assignments and class work for additional teacher support. Teachers also assisted with explicit teaching when required or needed. Over 50 students used our Homework Centre during 2013. All students have shown improvement in their learning skills, motivation and in their ability to get organised completing essential assessment work which would otherwise not be attempted at home.

Our second grant was used to send 150 Year 11 students by bus to the RYDA Road Safety Program at Penrith. The grant also paid for the student program cost. This has enabled those students to be better prepared for the challenges of managing a motor vehicle and to be better citizens on the roads. As our young people often travel in cars with friends, the need for responsible passenger behaviour was also a focus. They are more aware of both driving skills and the need for passenger responsible behaviour.

These programs would not run without the financial support of John Edmondson VC Memorial Club. ❖

A Message to JEHS Families

Dear Parents.

I am writing to inform you that I will be retiring from my position as Principal of John Edmondson High School. My last day of service will be Tuesday, 25th March 2014.

It will be a very sad day for me to leave JEHS as I have often stated I suffer from an acute case of proud principal syndrome. It has been a great pleasure and an honour to see the school grow from its establishment in 2005 with 172 Year 7 students to where it is now with 1,135 students in 2014. The reasons for my retirement are based on health professionals' advice and so I have accepted their recommendations (and my wife's advice!).

Yesterday I had the pleasure of watching our students participate in the annual Pop Idol concert and it gave me a chance to reflect upon what a great bunch of kids we have at JEHS. The performers and the back stage crew were magnificent; the talent and the hard work were a treat to see. Equally for me, it was wonderful to observe how supportive and positive the students in the audience were when their peers were on stage. The great work done by the music staff, Mr Potts, Mr Chavez, Ms Turco and our GA Mr Campbell is emblematic of the terrific contributions made by all the teaching and non-teaching staff at JEHS. I think it really is important to recognise the work done above and beyond the call of duty by our teachers and administrative staff. Each day they contribute so much to enrich the lives of our students and I want to thank them for doing so on your behalf.

I leave our school much comforted by the knowledge that we have two outstanding Deputy Principals, Mr Khanna and Ms Dorrell, to lead and manage JEHS until the Principal's position is advertised and filled in Term 2. Ms Dorrell will relieve as Principal for the remainder of Term 1 and Mr Khanna will relieve as Principal in Term 2. I hope and expect the position will be filled by the middle of Term 2.

My best wishes go to all our families. I look forward to reading and hearing of the wonderful achievements of our students both at school and beyond into their adult lives.

We have 203 students in Year 9 and it is a new experience for all of them as this is the first time they have elective subjects and leave school every second week for sport. Selecting electives proved to be a testing time as students tried subjects and decided that another subject might suit them better and led to many subject and class changes.

A few recent incursions for our Year 9 cohort include Bell Shakespeare production of Romeo and Juliet and Six Decades of Bullying.

The Motivational Media incursion will happen in the final week of Term 1.

Additionally, ten students will be participating in a series of workshops created and produced by Junctionworks. These workshops aim to improve and increase selfesteem, assertiveness and alert students about the folly of bullying, teasing and poor decision making.

Each year group at John Edmondson High School is responsible for a particular community and/or school activity. Year 9 students assist Year 7 students in reading roll call. They work as peer tutors with students as they assist them with reading and comprehension skills. By doing this, they learn about the difficulties some have with reading and by encouraging, supporting and building relationships the student tutors develop leadership and empathy skills. We currently have 38 Year 9 students that have completed the two training sessions and have started working with Year 7 each morning. ❖



Please remind them to access Schools Online and activate their PIN. This will allow them easy access to their HSC results at 6am the day it is released. Please keep the PIN in a safe spot as once lost, they will need to contact the Board of Studies directly for new access.

QUICKSMART 2014



John Edmondson High School has now been successfully running QuickSmart Numeracy program for the last three years. Mrs Kaye-Smith, QuickSmart Educator, tells us more.

This program has helped a number of our students to gain the confidence to

overcome their learning issues in Mathematics.



QuickSmart Numeracy aims to improve the numeracy development of students who

are experiencing learning problems or delays in Maths. The program focuses on improving students' understanding and recall of basic number facts, performance of elementary calculations and problem solving skills. Both structured and incidental strategy instruction are important features of numeracy lessons, with the aim of moving students on from relying on slow and error-prone strategies (especially count-by-one strategies) to the use of more sophisticated and efficient strategies, including automatic recall.

I am currently in my second Quick SmartEducator and I must say it has been very rewarding experience to



see the majority of students achieve levels beyond even their own expectations.

The students love coming to their QuickSmart sessions where they work with more confidence in a smaller group and individual sessions and this is reflected in their regular class work as well.

This year JEHS has also introduced a QuickSmart Literacy program. This program is currently identifying students that will be selected to participate in the program. Keep a look out in future newsletters to see the progress of this program. QuickSmart is a great way to learn for the child that just simply struggles. ❖


