# A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL **A FANTASTIC YEAR**

What a wonderful year we have had with many fine achievements from staff and students. It was clear when I first arrived in the school at the beginning of Term 3 the talent and commitment of staff to improve student learning was immense. The training that teachers have had over the last 18 months has improved the way we approach literacy across the school and this is evidenced most specifically by the improvement in the NAPLAN results of our Year 9 students with the rate of growth of student learning above state DEC averages in aspects of reading, writing, grammar & punctuation and numeracy, some above those state averages by very significant margins.

I have spent a significant amount of time over the past month interviewing parents who wish to enrol their children in our school in 2015. For the most part, we remain limited to local area enrolments as our school is to the maximum of our enrolment capacity. Many of these prospective students come from non-government schools and it is good to see that parents and the community realise that quality teaching and learning happens here and we deliver outcomes to students that are regularly better than can be delivered by our non-government colleagues.

We have provided and will continue to provide a vast array of learning experiences from deep and meaningful learning in the classroom, on sporting fields, in creative endeavours and our plans for 2015 and beyond will build on all these strengths.

Congratulations to all our students who have achieved their personal best (or as I said on our Presentation Evening, better than your best).

#### Sad Goodbyes

We are sadly saying goodbye to a number of staff this year for a range of purposes. Firstly we have three highly valued teachers who have reached the point where after long distinguished careers at this and other schools they will be retiring. Mr Steven Punch, our Head Teacher Science, Mr Mark Doyle, English Teacher Extraordinaire, and Mr Gary Smith, Maths teacher with a heart of gold. All these gentlemen are indeed gentlemen and their intelligence, their warmth, their humour and their compassion will be sorely missed by students and staff alike.

We also have a number of teachers leaving us to take up other opportunities. We have Ms Fretwell, Mr Cutmore, Ms Beckinsale

and Ms Kingston who I know will take with them fond memories of our school and we wish them all the best for the future.

Finally, a speacial thank you to Ms Lesley & Mr de Davenport-Stuart for their tireless work in our literacy



program, achieving great result with funding concluding this year.

#### **School Planning**

Our school planning cycles run for three years and our current planning cycle has come to an end. We have examined the areas in which we have made strong progress over the last few years as well as those areas that still require development.

sponsor child. Yidi is 13 and lives in Senegal with her parents and siblings. Senegal was affected by the Ebola crisis but the area where Yidi and her family lives was not affected.

One major way our sponsorship assists Yidi is through education. Although she is 13 she can neither read nor write and part of our sponsorship helps the community in which she lives with education and health care. Through the Nidiognick Area Development Program, Yidi and her community are assisted. This program aims to promote education by establishing playgrounds in primary schools to make the schools more attractive and to encourage parents to allow their children and to encourage their children to attend school regularly.

A health program has commenced which aims to monitor the access to health services. There has been an emphasis on nutrition with training sessions on child nutrition in eleven Learning and Child Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres. Part of this initiative is to monitor a school community? 🖈

#### NSW SCHOOLS CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Ón Monday, November 10th I was given the opportunity to attend the NSW Schools Constitutional Convention regarding the Constitutional Recognition of Indigenous Australians at NSW Parliament.

Behrendt (Professor Law and Director of Research, Jumbunna Indigenous House of Learning) (Professor of Constitutional Law, Sydney Law School) informed us about the different ways to recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Constitution. Both professors gave valuable information and ideas which enhanced a better understanding of the discussion topic.



After hearing from a panel of experts and considering these issues we were placed in groups of 10 to discuss two main topics regarding Indigenous Australians and their symbolic recognition in a preamble. After thorough discussion, we were given the chance to share our ideas with other groups.

At the conclusion of this Convention, all the delegates had to vote in a mock referendum. Most of delegates voted in favour of a proposed law, altering the Constitution to recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples, their cultures, languages and heritage and to replace racially discriminatory provisions.

Overall, there were about 100 students from different schools that came together on this day to share their knowledge, opinions and thoughts about this important issue. It was a wonderful experience as I got the chance to learn and interact with other students that shared similar beliefs and values as me. •



to a given problem. They also researched different materials and techniques and made sound choices that met the needs of their statement of intent.

Year 7 students designed Photo Frames, while Year 8's designed Wall Hangings using

their own imagination and skills learnt in the class.

Year 10 Food Technology class participated in fundraising activity as part of their Food Equity. Altogether we raised \$1900, which was donated to World Vision. What a great effort! Overall the fundraising days were great fun and allowed Year 10 students to understand the needs of developing countries. The Year 10 Sydney Tower excursion was a great success too. Students enjoyed the one hour lunch at Sydney Tower Buffet offering a wide selection of hot and cold meats, seafood, salads, international dishes and desserts and of course 360 degree panoramic views of Sydney, famous and

and






