### Senior success

Year 12 have just completed their Trial HSC examinations and are now in the final stages of their HSC studies. We still have a full term of learning ahead and every day in Term 3 is important to complete courses and to put in the necessary preparation and revision to ensure all our Year 12 students are fully prepared.

I have consistently advised Year 11 and 12 students that at least two hours of study per night is required to ensure success. While this would be most successful from the very beginning of Year 11, it is never too late. This is the stage that Year 12 need to be fully committed to do their best in all elements of their courses. There is no point getting to the end and then just 'give up'.

It's time to take the proverbial 'sprint to the line' for each Year 12 student to truly achieve the best they can.



### School Captains

Our school captains, Nikola Djordjevic and Shilpa Singh visited State Parliament late in Term 2 to hear how leadership in the NSW Government works. They viewed a sitting of the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative

Council and then had the opportunity to meet the State Governor, General David Hurley.

### Reporting on learning

Semester one reports for all students have now been completed. The quality of advice for parents and students about the learning of students is truly remarkable. I would advise parents that it is in the teacher comment that you will find the most valuable information about what each student has achieved, how they have worked in their classes and also clear advice for students and parents for areas in which students can improve, even for those who are achieving at very high levels.

### Parent Teacher Interviews

We will once again be conducting parent teacher interviews. This year they are on Tuesday 21st and Thursday 23rd of July from 3.30 to 7pm. We will again be taking bookings for these interviews online, and the instructions are detailed later in this newsletter.

I would like to encourage all parents, whether your children are performing well or those who are experiencing difficulties, to make appointments for these interviews so we can successfully work together so each student can get the very best out of their school experience.

### Technology for learning

We have now 18 interactive data projectors installed throughout the school and they are being used to enrich the learning provided to all students.

We are working hard to make sure that lessons are interesting and engaging for students and are relevant to the world we live in.

We are now turning our attention toward introducing a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) system into the school for the start of the 2016 school year. We will bring you

# BEBRAS COMPUTE



***On March 18, 23 JEHS students from Years 8, 9 and 10 completed the Bebras Australia Computational Thinking Challenge. Mrs Adams reports.***

It is an international initiative which aims to promote computational thinking in students. The Challenge supports the new Australian Digital

Technologies Curriculum and is funded by the Australian Government. The challenges are made of a set of short questions called Bebras tasks and are delivered via the cloud. To solve the tasks, students are required to think in

and about information, discrete structures, computation, data processing, and algorithmic concepts. Each Bebras task demonstrates an aspect of computational thinking and tests the talent of the participant.

Six groups from Years 8, 9 and 10 thoroughly enjoyed participating in the challenges. The Computing faculty is happy to report that two of the six groups received equal first place and were presented with medallions at the assembly by the our Principal, Mr Weatherstone.

# HSC & CAREERS EXPO

# YEAR 12 VISIT UWS



***On Wednesday, 3 June, over 80 Year 12 students travelled by bus to the Kingswood campus of the University of Western Sydney. Year 12 student Monique Rayhanna reports.***

Over the course of the day, each student attended an information session, two half hour lectures on a wide variety of subjects, lunch and finally a half hour session focused on university experience; the choices of which included tours, workshops and an animal science experience class.

Each student had to pick their own classes before the day and received a personalised timetable to be followed. First up was a meeting with a panel of four students and a professor at the university. Everything about university was explained; from the typical day of a university student, to alternate pathways into UWS.

After a hurried few minutes for questions, we were thrown out onto campus and told to decipher the map

and encoded instructions that would apparently lead to our first classes, in which university professors presented PowerPoints on the subject, in my case: Microscopy of the Living Cell. Half an hour later, we left those classrooms and were expected, assisted by current UWS students, to find the next one, accumulating a lot of exercise along the way as many of us trekked from one end of campus to the other. Once I had finally stumbled upon my Criminology classroom, another half hour PowerPoint and question session ensued, followed by lunch.

After our sausage sizzle lunch, many trooped off for tours of the campus and its student accommodations. I stayed on the lunch lawn for my final class – the Animal Science Experience in which a collection of five pythons and five lizards were put on display. Students were able to hold the reptiles and take photos to prove that we had indeed held a nineteen kilo olive python.

Overall, it was a surreal experience that provided a lot of insight into university life and what to expect when many of us ascend to tertiary education next year. Thank you to Mrs Violi for organising the day for us. ★

# EARLY LEAVERS

All absences need to be explained and this note will serve as an explanation. You can use the template provided here or ask for an absence book from the office. Alternatively you can just write a note for your child. ★

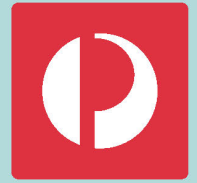
