Nearly 300 students received recognition awards in our Recognition Assembly in





Christopher Elvy: "Reading is good for the brain."


Lochlan Thomson: "The teachers fabulous."

I was taught that fear was the main culprit which held back many people from achieving their full potential. Fear is generated to protect us, but sometimes it blocks our path during critical times in life.

I was also taught that in order to confront fear, we must not let the irrational side of our brain take control over our body, rather, using rational and logical thoughts to comprehend what we are experiencing.

Asking ourselves, "What's the worst thing that can happen if I take action" and "If I don't take action, what will it cost me?" reassembles the thoughts into something easier to comprehend during a time of crisis.

One memorable experience was breaking a wooden board with my bare hands. I remember crying while writing down all the things I hated about myself on one side of the board, as feelings of regrets started to emerge. On the other side, I had to write down all the things I wanted to become and

The analogy of this exercise was to illustrate that we are capable to become the things we truly want to become, by putting in persistence, dedication and hard work. By breaking through the board to the other side, where all the positive thoughts are written, shows how you can overcome FEAR (False Expectations Appearing Real).

This camp created a safe environment where I was not looked down upon for making mistakes, instead we applauded and encouraged each other that mistakes were good, because it is fertiliser for us to grow into a stronger person. I learnt new tactics to reach my true leadership potential and to form new relationships in the future.

To conclude this, I want to share with you my favourite inspirational quote which has stuck with me ever since the camp, "We should realise that challenges we face are actually blessings in disguise which allow us to grow stronger". #
