

Lastly, stay safe in the holidays, have fun, spend time with family and friends, and back the Sharkies to win another premiership in 2017. #




blood donation report: more than 1,000 donations

This year we have had more than 150 staff and students give live saving donations. Last year we were the number One school in Sydney, something that we can all be very proud of. Recently we were made aware of that since our program started, we have made over 1000 blood donations!

Almost every person in the school knows of someone who has suffered from the terrible disease of Cancer. As you can see from the diagram below, 34% of donations help treat people with Cancer:

year eleven report: leadership focus Regina Young - Year Eleven Adviser

This is a vitally important term for Year 11 students, as it is the first term of their Higher School Certificate year. All school assessments count toward the Higher School Certificate and it is important that students understand that they must make a genuine and diligent attempt with all assessments.

If an assessment is missed students must submit an Illness/Misadventure form to Mrs Violi with accompanying documentation. If the request is denied, a mark of zero will be awarded for the task.

Attendance is also critically important to successfully complete Year 12. Not only as being present in class means that students have the opportunity to participate in discussions and benefit from hearing other people's opinions, they can ask questions for clarification and seek assistance from their teachers. Also, attendance is important as BOSTES requires a minimum of 85% attendance to qualify for the Higher School Certificate. With an attendance rate of less than 85% students are at risk of receiving N Determination Warning letters asking them to complete missed classwork.

If the work is not satisfactorily completed the warning will become a N Determination, if a student receives two N Determinations in one subject they are at risk of not satisfying BOSTES requirements for a Higher School Certificate.

Many students do not realise the importance of participation in class activities and miss opportunities to enhance their knowledge and understanding of the content and hence their results. It is important for all students to make a concerted effort with Year 12 making school and study a priority and ensuring that their Higher School Certificate result accurately reflects their ability and potential. It has been a busy term with the 2017 Leadership Team having successfully run the annual Anglicare Food Drive, acted as tour guides and references for the annual JEHS Year 6 Orientation Night and the Vice Captains have hosted the annual Sports Assembly.

Azhar Ali, Jarrod Moren, Sean O'Brien, Allysha Grattan, Claudia Vella, Jason Zhong donated blood and Emily Baonza and Syhra Duazo attended the University of Technology Sydney *Women in Engineering* & *IT Hands-on Day*.



hsie report: War memorial for modern history Alex Gardiner - Head Teacher, HSIE



Friday, November 18, along with my Year 11 Modern History class, I was struggling to wake up at 5:00am and stay up to

get to school and have my name marked off. But we made it. *Branka Manojlovic* tells us about it.

Accompanied by Miss Chisholm, we arrived 4 hours later at Australia's Capital Territory, Canberra. Following us from Sydney was the heat which reached a top of 36 degrees, really placing us in a non-irritated ecstatic mood after a sleepless night!

We arrived at the prestigious War Memorial of Australia (AWM) where we were welcomed to a new world of military history. Surrounding us was Australia's most pristine WWI and WWII sources, as well as artefacts and information from other wars Australia has been involved in.

Artillery, weapons, letters, uniforms, artworks and lethal documents which directly correlated to the war were taken into close observation by myself and fellow pupils.

Essentially these sources were to give us better understanding and knowledge about the war from different points of view. Yet
