8V said of Science that they loved dissecting hearts (ew!) as well as doing pracs and learning about the body.

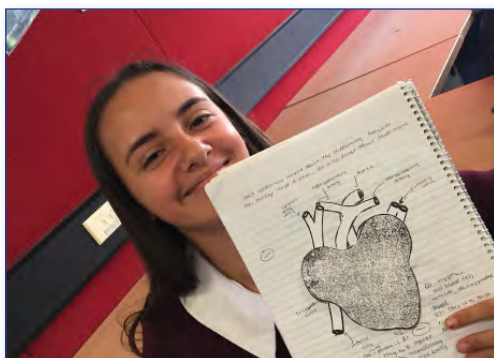
8R were enthusiastic about Metal, because they got to not only make things but also learn about the process of how to make

In Ghana weather conditions are tropical and most of the population are engaged in farming. Access to clean water is difficult and many children are malnourished. Common diseases include malaria, diarrhoea and respiratory infections.

Her father is a farmer, she baby sits to help her family and she attends school and is in Grade 1. However, many children in this part of Africa do not receive an education and illiteracy rates are extremely high, especially amongst girls.

We look forward to hearing more about Yinmah as she grows and our sponsorships assists her and her village.

We also support World Vision by contributing to Child Rescue which rehabilitates children as young as 5 and 6 who have been victims of child abuse, human trafficking, debt bondage and child labour. #

The consequences for missed deadlines can be quite severe with a mark of zero being awarded for non-submission of work without a valid Illness and Misadventure form which is given to Mrs Violi. An N Determination Warning letter will be issued in these instances and if these are not resolved it could result in a student not being awarded a Higher School Certificate.

In cases of misadventure, please be reminded that copies of these illness/misadventure forms may be downloaded from the school website: http://web1.jedmondson-h.schools.nsw.edu.au/internet/jehs/pdfs/illness_misadventure.pdf

The forms are to then be taken to the appropriate authority for signature. These forms must be submitted on the first day that the student returns to school.

If students realise early that their school assessments are crucial to their final results hopefully more time and effort will be expended on them and as a result students

will be working consistently throughout the year and not making a last minute dash to learn.

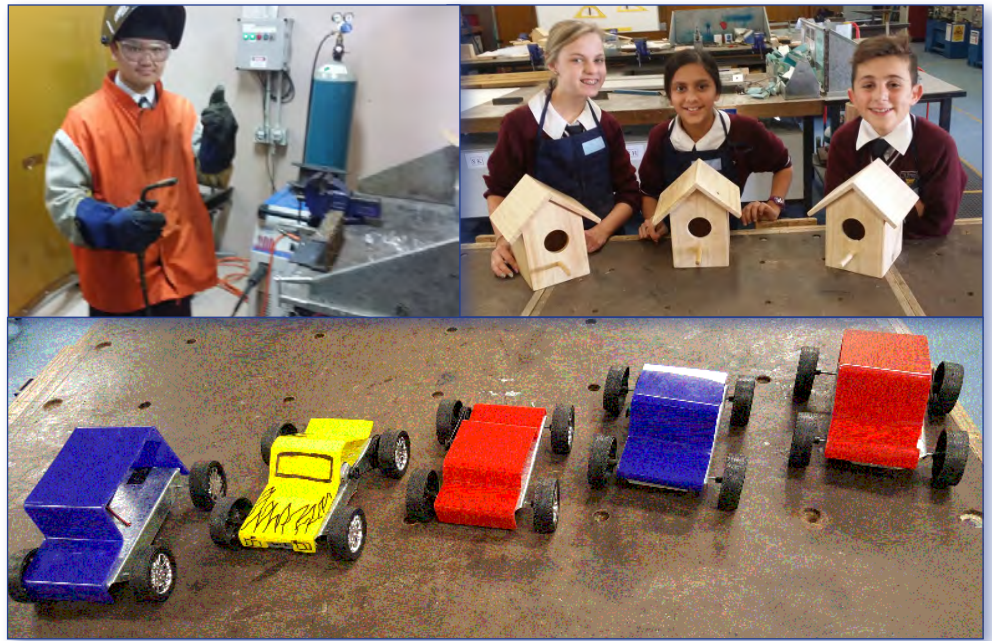

These results can be compared to their Year 8 VALID results to assess their scientific development.

Our Year 12 students have wrapped up their formal studies as they complete their final preparations for their HSC exams. It has been a privilege to help guide them through their final year at JEHS and we wish

them the best of luck in their exams and we eagerly await to hear of their continued success in life.

They have now completed their Preliminary science studies and are coming to terms with the perceived stress and workload that has become synonymous with the HSC course.
