## year seven report: positive transformations

Year 7 have been doing a fantastic job fitting into their classes, and comments from parents and teachers indicate that they are genuinely impressed at the progress being made.

Students are working hard to understand the class content and are also confidently asking questions when they need clarification. This Year 7 group seems to be enjoying their time at JEHS and come to school to experience learning in a positive manner.

While every class has challenges from time to time, for the most part students are on task, behaving well, and engaging with the lessons teachers are providing.

However, it should be mentioned that there are individuals and sometimes small

groups within classes that are not focused on learning.

A small minority of students in Year 7 are frequently getting in trouble for not following instructions, not working to the best of their ability, and/or distracting their peers. These kinds of problems do not just affect the students causing them - they affect everyone in the classroom.

School is not always easy. In fact sometimes it can be very hard. All students need to remember though; it is in their best interest to work to their potential and focus on the class content.

Teachers will not tolerate disruptive behaviour and there have been a number of suspensions recently that illustrate this. Improvements from students who have had difficulties in the past should be celebrated though.

Over the past two terms, and through this term so far, numerous improvements have been made across the year group. Year 7 students and their teachers have witnessed some highly positive transformations in the attitude and work ethic of students who had formerly struggled in the classroom. This could not have been done without the engagement of parents within the community, and the strong effort of students, teachers, and other staff members at JEHS.

We will continue to work with students that have struggled to do well at school, and we should all look forward to seeing more and more improvements in the future. **#** 




Year 8 had their subject selection night on August 2 which gave them information about all the different options for their elective choices for next year.

It is really important students pick subjects that they enjoy and want to study, and that can assist them in their prospective future job/uni/TAFE ambitions.


A balance is really important as well, having 6 subjects that are predominately extended

response essay writing based may lead to students having a heavy work load. Don't pick subjects based on scaling, last year's results or who the teacher may be.

Speaking to parents and students at the Parent/Teacher Night and the Subject Selection Night, I noted that people were wondering how to best prepare students for assessments and what lies ahead in Yr 10 and beyond.

On October 23 we have an Elevate Seminar being presented to Year 10 covering skills on how to study effectively, such as note taking, conceptual learning skills and standing out in assessments. This will hopefully benefit students transitioning in to Stage 6 work next year and ultimately preparing them for the HSC in 2 years time.

Lastly, if your child has an 'N' Determination for incomplete work, please encourage them to get this sorted and complete it ASAP so they can achieve their ROSA. Outstanding 'N' Determination's that have not been completed can put your child at risk of not progressing to Year 11. It is imperative that students complete course work and don't miss assessment tasks. #

All students in this grade will sit for the CoCat test, with results available later in the year. Although Year 12 have completed their trials and are coming to grips with the feedback from their teachers, it is still time for hard work.

It is an important time as they have the opportunity to ask for additional feedback, submit practice papers and improve their ability to deconstruct questions and their analytical skills. Also, subject content is still being taught which requires focus and application, both in the classroom and at home.

Many teachers are holding revision sessions and these provide opportunities for students to clarify content, ask questions and improve their overall performance. Soon they will be issued with a "Signing Out of School" booklet, which contains all the information they require regarding the end of school picnic, sports day, graduation and formal.

Over the past twelve months many of the Year 12 students have demonstrated great enthusiasm for working with younger students in peer reading, donating blood, spending time on weekends collecting for the Salvation Army and actively supporting fundraising events at school organised and run by the SRC. This is a credit to them and indicates their ability to understand the needs of people less fortunate and the importance of being part of the community.

Sport has played a very significant part of their life and Jessica Smith has recently

been selected to play at the NSW region for lawn bowls, which is an outstanding achievement.

University open days are fast approaching and many students are eager to 'shop around' for the 'best fit' in terms of travel time, courses, scholarships and career opportunities.

Equally important are TAFE courses and various pathway opportunities. Students are encouraged to check their DET Portal regularly for updates from Miss Tran about dates for applications and various assistance with fees and other costs.

In Ms Gill's Kitchen, 7E have gained independent skills in the kitchen. Students learnt about the importance of home cooking as opposed to ready prepared meals in terms of cost and taste.

With a focus on literacy and numeracy, students were engaged in the task of grocery shopping and exchanging money. Students' shopping lists were written with a range of raw vegetable ingredients such as onions, lemons and bananas and weighed to calculate the cost of each within the kilo price.

Students took turns to calculate the cost of all ingredients and purchased the items using sample money. Other condiment ingredients were measured up in jugs, table spoons and teaspoons as well as measuring cups.

They calculated the weight of solids and amount of liquids using a kitchen scale and a practical approach of recipe accuracy. To encourage some good home cooking, students engaged in a cooking guessing game with 'What is the Chef's Technique?'

Ms Gill demonstrated the skills of whisking, simmering, dicing, slicing and many more ways of preparing ingredients as the students correctly guessed the technique.

In 7R's PDHPE lessons with Mr Lloyd, students engaged in a concept study to understand 'How do relationships change during adolescence?' There were three main rounds for students to complete, the quick-thinking game of SCOOT!, the think-aloud strategy of problem solving in social situations and finally the mature advice in hypothetical situations to adolescents in the 21 st Century.

In a game of SCOOT !, each player had a grid to answer 30 questions on pieces of cards that were passed around every time Mr. Lloyd shouted SCOOT! Students enjoyed being part of a fast-pace activity which required concentration on each question with only 30 seconds to write the answer. The questions challenged each students' understanding of puberty, peer pressure, and facts or opinions about adolescents.

When covering more sensitive concerns of adolescence, 7R worked in groups to write a script for the awkward scenarios in the fictional Australian youth text, Lockie Leonard Human Torpedo. This task required student empathy and use of verbal reasoning to construct an open and assertive communication between two or three people.

The major concerns of the sample scenarios involved Lockie's response to peer pressure, his conversations with his mum about growing up and how he can explain his feelings to others. Students found this task relevant to possible and similar situations they may experience, although they began to think aloud with an inner dialogue of questions such as "What would I say or do in that situation?"

Students who constructed their scripts in pairs understood that thinking aloud was necessary and sometimes misunderstandings are possible in sensitive situations.

From Adolescence to Adulthood, 7R were very mature when writing a letter of advice to the fictional Australian grommet, Lockie Leonard. They found that by giving another person advice, it can empower one's own self-confidence in similar situations.

With some reasonable and practical recommendations from one teenager to another, 7R developed an understanding of how to manage and conduct yourself amongst people. #





### clim report: engagement is alive! Krys Papic - Co-ordinating Teacher

Are Tool Caddies, cool caddies? Are human body's truly digestive machines? These are just two important projects that 8K and 8U have been investigating solidly during Term 3.

Both classes must be commended on their ability to engage in lesson content, interact in various group situations and write meaningful texts.

Upon analysing various tool caddy /tool bag images, 8K and 8U have been armed with the 'tools' to determine negative and positive features of various innovative caddies.

Through text modelling of a 'Review', students were able to identify the structure, highlight what makes a successful review, plan and consolidate their understanding by




writing a review for a fictitious 'Bunning's Warehouse' catalogue.

Skills gained from this task included a focus on:

- audience awareness
- captivating the reader's attention through the use of a 'hook',
- using appropriate tone
- using paragraphs/correct punctuation and grammar
- using informative and analytical language
- Self and peer editing

Students have been challenged to be critical and analytical and this is evident in their outstanding reviews.

"When I hear, I forget, when I see, I remember, when I do, I understand" (Questacon, Canberra). These very words



were the impetus for 8K's Science Human Digestive Display.

Students were taught the fine art of notetaking whilst watching various clips about the Human Digestive System. 8K then engaged in a modelled construction of writing a PEEL paragraph about a human digestive organ. The PEEL paragraphs demonstrated 8K's ability to showcase their scientific knowledge in a well-structured, 'Essay' text.

The success of this project reached a climax when students worked in friendship groups to create either a 2D or 3D 'Human Digestive System Display'. Students had to plan their time wisely in order to plan their displays in 5 minutes.

Labelled diagrams, sketches and notes were created with enthusiasm. Students worked to a deadline by completing the task within 25 minutes.

According to Mrs Rachelle Lavorato, who assisted with the task, "It was great to see students use their creativity in Science. Collaboration was at its best during this hands-on task. I wish I was there to see their presentations."

Our students inspire each other. Class engagement was alive and very much infectious! #

The class was required to create a model of Ancient China showing the great wall of china and geographical features and pinpointing historical sites. Term 3 has been a busy time for students and staff with Year 12 students completing their final assessments for all of the senior Science courses, as well as their final modules.

Year 12 Chemistry students have completed research on Sydney Water treatment and the importance of regular chemical monitoring and management to ensure safe drinking water. Now students are investigating products and processes in Industrial Chemistry.

Our Year 12 Biology class conducted a cow eye dissection to gain a greater understanding of how the eye works; this is needed for their studies on the Communication topic. They were fascinated by how elaborate the eye was and just how much there was to see in the dissection like removing the lens and the iris.

Our current Year 11 students are working towards completing course work in

preparation for the final examinations at the end of this term. Chemistry students are currently investigating solubility rules, calculating concentrations of solution, as well as developing their skills in making a standard solution.

On June 23, Year 11 Senior Science spent the day at the Georges River National Park. They completed scientific tests to measure the many features of the ecosystem including a survey of the vegetation present, pH levels of the soil and wind speed at both a high and low test sites.

The students enjoyed being out in the bushland so much so that they opted to take the guided long route back to the low site via a bushwalking track. It was fantastic to see the students enjoying relevant practical experience in a natural setting where these tests are most applicable.

Year 9 students are learning about light - reflection, refraction and absorption and participating in hands on practical activities to further develop their understanding.

Our Year 8 students are delving further into human systems and having an opportunity to dissect various organs.

Subject selection evening was an opportunity for year 10 students and their parents to learn about the new syllabus commencing in 2018. For Preliminary students in 2018, changes to subject modules and assessments for Chemistry, Physics and Biology that have been made, along with the introduction of a new course "Investigating Science". Please refer to the information booklet provided to you child for further information.

The Science faculty held Science Week from August 14 - 18. This involved various activities, demonstrations and competitions available for all students during lunch time. Some activities included making a mechanical hand, canister rockets, lava lamps, tea bag rockets, paper plan competition, many fun experiments, as well as our first "Breaking Out" amazing race. We had many students getting involved in these fun activities. **#**

## making modernism


#### O'Keeffe, Preston, Cossington Smith 'Making Modernism' Art Gallery of NSW 1 Jul – 2 Oct 2017

On Wednesday July 19, Stage 6 Visual Arts students discovered how Georgia O'Keeffe, Margaret Preston and Grace Cossington Smith (Making Modernism - Art Gallery of NSW) championed a new way of picturing the world during the transformative decades of the early to mid-20th century.


Rejecting artistic conventions of the past, these three artists became trailblazers of a shared modernist vision that embraced vivid colour, light, vitality and optimism.

# still life artworks

#### Term 3 is always a very busy time of year in the Industrial Arts Faculty and this year has been no different.



As we draw closer to the end of high school for Year 12, they are also bombarded with important dates and deadlines they need to adhere to.

More importantly, UAC (University Admission Centre) is now open for students to pay and apply their university preferences. This closes midnight 29th September 2017 and costs \$58. If they leave this til after the 29th September, the price increases to \$183.

There are also a number of other ways students can apply for University.

• They include **SRS (School Recommendation Scheme**. SRS are one way institutions make early offers of undergraduate admission, using a criteria other than (or in addition to) the ATAR. This is a FREE pathway through UAC whereby 12 institutions will be participating in SRS in 2017-2018. SRS application takes approximately 30mins and closes Midnight Friday 29th September 2017.

• Early Entry – All students have been forwarded an email of an electronic brochure when the institutions early entry pathway is open. This application opening and closing dates vary and applications generally take up to over an hour. Year 11 and Year 12 reports and a submission of about their Leadership commitment, voluntary works and desire to study at the applied uni are also necessary. Please encourage students to start this early as it may take some time to collate information.

• Uni Scholarships – This is done directly through the university and can be found under the desired faculty they degree falls under. There are so many scholarships but it is important that they read the criteria carefully as they may not be eligible.

• Equity Access Scheme EAS – This is a FREE Scheme done through UAC that aims to help students whose education has been

negatively affected during Year 11 and or 12 to receive an offer to university. This is where students may obtain bonus points to gain admission into courses.

• Equity Scholarships ES – are designed to assist disadvantage students with general costs with tertiary education. You need to prove that you receive Centrelink payments such as ABSTUDY, Austudy, Youth Allowance, Newstart Allowance, Disability Support Pension, parenting Payment or Carer Payment.

• **Colleges** – Students who do not achieve the ATAR required for undergraduate courses can apply for colleges later in the year. If they do well (depending on the chosen course) they may be eligible to transition into First or Second year corresponding courses. **#** 



#### Year 10 students need to keep in check with all the career information available to them.

**TAFE** - Please check your emails regularly and listen out for Roll Call notices. I send everyday apprenticeship and traineeship opportunities, TVET (TAFE Vocational Education Training) opportunities and work experience information.

2018 TVET courses are now available and offered to students in Years 10-12 in 2018. I encourage students who are studying the HSC pathway to apply instead of students who are study the ATAR pathway due to the regular school absence and course demands.

All courses are funded by the government and at this stage only an Expression of Interest is required. Please send any student who are interested to the Careers office for a form. Applications close September 20, 2017. For all students who are looking at leaving school and attending TAFE next year, I have been informed by TAFE that February intake opens this October. You can still go to https://www.tafensw.edu.au/courseareas and have a look at course descriptions, modules and delivery location although this is subject to change depending on demand.

**Work Experience** – Students who are over 14 years (by application/interview only) are encouraged to undertake work experience. This is a fantastic way to gain industry experience with the possibility of obtaining paid employment. Forms are found outside my office in a black tray. Students are required to seek their own placement if they are to do work experience and are encouraged to complete a minimum of 5 consecutive days. However, this is flexible and can be negotiated between the family and the employer.

Work experience cannot take place on the day of an assessment task as this will always

take priority. They will need to work around their assessment schedule and calendar which can be found on the school website.
