deputy principal report: welcome to the new school year

Welcome Parents, Students and Caregivers to a new school year. It is hard to believe that 2018 is upon us already.

With it brings an exciting new year of learning for all students, a period of adjustment to new teachers and classes, and for some, the finding of new friends. I look forward to working with Years 7, 9 and 11 students; Mr Khanna is the Deputy Principal for Years 8, 10 and 12 students.





YEAR 7

The year has seen a smooth transition for the majority of the Year 7 cohort.

From the beginning all Year 7 students were engaged in a Transition Program which focussed on familiarising the students with their school. They learned about the school's layout, bell times, how to follow a timetable, the merit system and were engaged in icebreaker games which helped build rapport and strengthen friendship groups.

The Year 7 Year Adviser, Ms Larah Kelly and Assistant Year Adviser, Mr Jake Imer, have worked tirelessly to ensure all students are settled and confident in adjusting to their new school environment.

I have conducted a survey for all Year 7 students regarding their first week. The responses have been overwhelmingly positive. They vocalised some pre-existing fears such as finding friends, finding their way around school, coping with school work and assessments and generally 'fitting in'. However, after the first week, the students reported they felt at ease, they knew their timetables, their teachers and the location of their classes. To master this in the space of one short week is a fantastic effort and

I commend Year 7 students on the way in which they have transitioned into high school. The Year Adviser, the Assistant Year Adviser, the Deputies and teachers will continue to work with the Year 7 students, ensuring that their transition and time at school is a positive experience.

Year 7 students were involved in a study skills program facilitated by Mandy Kirk,

our Teacher Librarian and Regina Young, Teacher Coordinator of Assessment. The focus was on how to use the student diary, how to prepare for assessments, how to research for assessments and how to timemanage.

Ms Young discussed the assessment policy, assessment schedules and assessment calendars. To date, Year 7 students have undergone quite an intensive transition program which further helped them to engage in all aspects of the school. I'd like to remind parents that all relevant information pertaining to our school, including assessments, policies, calendars, learning guides, BYOD information etc, can be located on our school website. I do encourage all parents to familiarise themselves with this amazing tool.





YEAR 9

Our Year 9 students have also transitioned very well. Our Year meetings

focused on the importance of maintaining a positive attitude and work ethic. 2018 provides a new start so I encourage all students to complete all work to the best of their ability.

This year, Year 9 students may be in different classes for their English, Maths, HSIE and Science lines as well as their electives. year eight report: students continue to impress

Year 8 have started off very strong this year with an excellent term so far.

I have noticed a significant improvement since last year, an overall focus in class, a reduction in behaviour management issues, and a generally friendlier environment in the classrooms.

Students who have had significant struggles in previous years have started fresh with a renewed work ethic. It is great to see how much progress Year 8 has made, from the beginning of Year 7, until now.

There are several challenges across the cohort that still need some serious work to overcome. Firstly, students having issues with others should take the matter to their

teacher rather than seek to "get back at them" as that only ever causes the problem to escalate and become worse.

Secondly, ignoring students that are seeking to distract or disturb you is not an effective solution: teachers need to know so they can take action.

Thirdly, too often students are not keeping their hands to themselves in the playground. This is not OK as even things that have begun as fun between friends, can easily become something more dangerous.

Lastly, students need to remember that it is important to comply with all teacher instructions - teachers are here to create a safe and high quality learning environment, and students are here to learn.

I am quite positive and optimistic about the progress students are making academically, socially and behaviourally. Every week students impress me with their growing maturity and the manner in which they now deal with issues that would have previously left them stumped. Issues between friendship groups that might have torn friends apart last year are now being fixed with little effort. Students who had often caused concerns last year are now receiving praise on a regular basis.

As Year Adviser for Year 8, I can gladly say I am proud of how much students have grown and I look forward to seeing what Term 2 will bring! #

As always, I encourage you to print a copy off so you can help your child stay prepared for whatever assessments may be coming up.

This allows students to plan, prepare and get feedback in advance of all tasks, so there are no 'nasty surprises.'

As they are now in Year 10, if there is a reason for your child to miss a task (either submission deadline or attendance at school), they must complete an Illness/ Misadventure form and return it the first day they return to school. Even better, feel free to call the school and leave a message for the teacher or head teacher of the subject, or me as Year Adviser, so we support them in the best way possible.

Aside from assessments, about 50 of our Year 10 students have also been involved in a peer mentoring program, where they





support Year 7 students as they transition into high school. This is a wonderful leadership opportunity and Ms Day and Ms Coluccio (the facilitators of the program) have been really impressed with the initiative, motivation and enthusiasm shown by the students.

In the sporting arena, Year 10 had swimming carnival representation from Elizabeth Livermore, Kiahna Narayan, Justin Opena, Brodie Piper and Harrison Yoeum. Congrats!

ANSTO Chemistry Excursion by Tatiana Tilman

Year 12 Chemistry students had the opportunity to experience real life applications by visiting the Nuclear Reactor at Lucas Heights.

On Thursday, 15 February JEHS's Year 12 chemistry class embarked on an educationally enhancing experience to ANSTO (Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation) in relation to their Production of Materials topic specifically the nuclear chemistry side of things, led by none other than the chemistry enthusiast herself, Mrs Campbell and courtesy of driver, Kev.

Upon arrival to our rather remote destination situated in Lucas Heights, we were already able to observe the grandness of the organisation with many buildings and workers we could see.

To begin the tour we were situated in the discovery centre which displayed various interactive activities in regards to science, such as a digital microscopes and water vortexes in bottles.

We were then accompanied by another school and listened to one of the presenters, Suzy, give an overview of nuclear chemistry and what ANSTO's significance is to the world of nuclear chemistry. One of the interactive activities incorporated into this presentation, was testing the radioactivity of our bodies through the palm of our hand

using a scintillation counter.

Out of all the people in the room who were tested, Jordan Le was the most radioactive that morning with a reading of 6 compared the everyone else who measured 4-5, which we later concluded was from a banana he ate that morning.

We then got into the bus and then Suzy directed us through to ANSTO's prize possessions, the site of the reactors - which required a security and safety check off by

the federal police, who had their very own pit stop.

The first location we checked out was ANTARES, where we were able to see first-hand the grand size of one of the largest particle accelerators, as well as understand and learn more about the uses of radiocarbon dating.

Moving on, we were taken to the

Open Pool Australian Lightwater (OPAL) auditorium where the tour guide talked us through various models of nuclear chemistry tools and uses and not to

mention, the live stream footage of what was occurring inside the actual nuclear reactor since it is an off-site area.

We concluded our trip at the very delicious ANSTO canteen/cafe which had lots to offer such as burgers, chicken dishes and beverages, before heading back to school.

Overall, as a class we enjoyed the trip down to ANSTO and believed it had great educational value due to its hands-on and highly engaging nature. We'd also like to say

science report: exploring our enquiring minds Lucy Campbell - Head Teacher

In the classroom

Addition to learning outside the classroom, key elements, understanding and skills are developed within the classroom environment.

All year groups have been busy with expanding their knowledge and skills.

YEAR 7

Our first unit of study in Science taught students the importance of being safe in the laboratory and prepared them for exciting experiments and activities. Year 7 students adjusted well to High School thus far and are eager to learn.

Their first assessment task will be a practical in class task during Week 9, you can expect to receive the notification for this in Week 7. Year 7 are encouraged to use their diaries to ensure they are completing all homework and assessments by their due dates.

YEAR 8

Year 8 students have settled in and are now no longer the smallest fish in the big pond. They have begun learning about plants and ecosystems and the importance they have for our survival.

Their first Assessment Task for Science this year will be towards the end of Term 1 where they will be required to perform a practical

task in a small group. This term they should focus on improving their practical skills and communication with their peers in order to assist them in this task.

YEAR 10

Year 10 students have started the topic of evolution and genetics this term. They have also received their first assessment task this year which is the Independent Research Project. Students choose their own experiments to complete independently at home. They will be given some direction by their teacher during class time to assist them to complete the task. The final report /logbook are due in week 11 term 1.

YEAR 11

All science Year 11 students have commenced the new syllabus for each of the Science courses offered. Part of this new syllabus will include all students to complete a depth study which will be guided through by our teachers. In the Preliminary course all students will have an assessment task for each term which is clearly outlined in the learning guides that all students have received, as well as available on the school website.

The Year 11 Chemistry students are investigating properties and structure of matter which involves students exploring concepts and engaging in practical activities

to further develop their understanding and skills. Further to linking science to the real world, an excursion to ANSTO Nuclear Reactor will be offered next term to continue to develop student knowledge.

The students of Year 11 Physics have started studying kinematics to develop an understanding of describing, measuring and analysing motion. Students will work scientifically to design, evaluate and conduct investigations to solve problems related to kinematics. This will relate to their next assessment task in Week 9, which is an in class investigation.

YEAR 12

Year 12 Biology students are finishing their topic of" Maintaining a Balance" where they have been studying how the body works. Further investigations will occur in their next topic which is the "Blueprint of Life" where they will be studying DNA, genetics and how inheritance occurs. Students are strongly encouraged to prepare themselves well for all assessments.

Year 12 Physics students have started studying their second topic which is Motors and Generators. In this topic students will conduct experiments using DC/AC electric motors, and will learn about the structure and function of different types of generators and motors. #

et report: Ursing vocational qualifications Ollie Claydon - VET Coordinator

Term 1 has been an exciting time for VET students who have been involved in a wide range of activities.

Many of our Year 11 students have been completing their first mandatory work placement and some Year 12 students have completed their second compulsory week of work.

This has been an extremely valuable experience for students as they pursue vocational qualifications in Information & Digital Technology, Hospitality, Construction or Business Services.

Each Year 11 student attended Work Ready Day at JEHS where they attended mock interviews with Corporate Training and received vital information on behaviour in the workplace.

This was a mandatory activity that enabled students to be ready and confident in approaching their first work placement. #





pdhpe report: basic skills tests and games galore

Students have been very busy within PDHPE this term.

Our practical lessons have covered a range of things from modified games and basic skills testing and Court Games in Stage 4, to Cultural Dance and Games, and Striking Games in Stage 5.

Our elective PASS classes have been completing alternative sports such as the Swedish game of *Tchoukball* in Year 9, while Year 10 have been completing fitness testing and learning how to appropriately conduct these tests themselves.

Throughout our theory lessons, Years 7-10 have been developing their knowledge and understanding about a range of health related skills.

Year 7 have been looking at the issues around transitioning to high school and developing skills relating to their resilience, who to go to for support, how to deal and help other people in different situations.

They have also developed an understanding of the different forms of bullying and harassment and how to deal with these situations. Our Year 8 classes have been exploring the risks when using roads and how to make safe and responsible decisions when faced with an unsafe situation.

Year 9's focus this term has been around inclusivity and how to be more accepting whilst Year 10 have been increasing their understanding around nutrition, in particular, the increasing amounts of sugar in our foods.

They have also examined how to use nutritional information to make appropriate healthy decisions relating to food choices and examined how the media can influence our ideas around body image.

Each year group would have also just completed their first theory assessment

task for the semester. Each of these tasks have had a range of skills that were being assessed relating to the units of work being studied. Our faculty are looking forward to seeing the results of these formal assessment tasks.

Next term, Year 7 will learn about the changes, both physical and emotional, that they face throughout adolescence. They will also be exploring the concepts of puberty, the factors that influence who they are and the qualities of productive relationships. In Year 8, students will turn their focus to how they locate and identify reliable sources of health information. They are also starting to look at a range of issues around sexual health including the influence of gender expectations and protective behaviours.

Our Stage 5 courses in Year 9 and 10 will focus on an increase in awareness of Mental Health issues and the access to support as well as the development of communication skills and working in collaborative situations. Year 10 will also concentrate on the development of respectful relationships and how to identify and respond to abusive situations. A mandatory aspect of the PDHPE Curriculum is developing an awareness of Domestic Violence and students will be exploring this within the Year 10 Unit of work.

As each of next term's units will cover some sensitive issues, students will be given a course specific letter detailing what will be taught. If at any time, you would like to talk about what your child will be learning, please don't hesitate to contact their class teacher.

Important Practical Information

As the weather becomes cooler, students still need to be prepared for practical lessons and are expected to wear their full sports uniform. The school has a tracksuit for sale that students can wear with their

PE uniform throughout the winter period if they need. Tights are not accepted as sports uniform and students will not be allowed to participate in these (unless they wear their PE shorts over the top).

Students are also reminded that they must wear their full school uniform to and from school, even if they have a practical lesson first or last period. They are provided with the facilities and time to get changed for every lesson.

As practical lessons are a compulsory part of the PDHPE Curriculum, students are expected to actively participate in 85% of these lessons. Students who are not at this level will receive a Letter of Concern as they are at risk of not meeting the Practical requirements. If your child has a medical condition that prevents this level of participation, they will need a doctor's certificate for the period that they will be missing.

We would also like to remind parents and carers, that for Year 9 and 10 sport, students travel outside of school each fortnight, with their class, to participate in a variety of recreational activities. Please be mindful that payment for these activities must be completed before their sport day. Money will not be accepted on the day.

Sport is a compulsory part of school and participation in the activities provided by the school is mandatory. Students are required to be with their class at all times and must travel to their away sport with their class. They can not decide that they do not want to go. If there are difficulties with payments, or having students travel away from school for sport, parents need to contact our Sports Organiser Miss Ryan prior to the day so that alternate arrangements can be made. Your continued support for this matter is greatly appreciated. #
