Task Description/Overview
Students who are achieving an ATAR will be required to complete the HSC Trial Examination. There will be ONE examination that will test students' knowledge of the course content studied throughout the year.
Detailed Assessment Task Description
The ATAR Trial Examination will be one exam, consisting of four sections. Students will have 10 minutes reading time + 2 hours and 30 minutes working time. Here is the breakdown of each section: Section I - Texts and Human Experiences: Short Answer Questions Students will engage with a variety of unseen texts that deal with the concept of Human Experiences. They will then complete a range of short answer questions.
2) Section II - Texts and Human Experiences: Billy Elliot Essay Students will then complete ONE extended response that communicates their knowledge of their prescribed text 'Billy Elliot'.
3) <u>Section III - Elective Modules: Reflection</u> Students will be given a guided question/statement about the 'We are Australian' and/or 'Playing the Game' module, then complete a reflective piece, answering the question/statement.
4) Section IV - Writing Skills: Creative Writing Students use the stimulus to produce either a creative, discursive or persuasive text.
NOTE: Due to the unseen nature of the examination questions, marking criteria cannot be provided.
