Task Description / Overview

THIS TASK HAS TWO PARTS

Students will be given a stimulus of the **SUNSMART** health promotion initiative of the Ottawa Charter in action.

You will be provided with **THREE SEEN** questions (handed in, during class, using the attached scaffold) and **TWO UNSEEN** questions (to be completed in class during period 2).

PART A – Seen questions completed in own time. Handed in during period 2 Tuesday 2nd April using the attached scaffold.

- Outline the aim/s of the SUNSMART Health Promotion initiative. (3 marks)
- Identify a partnership that has been used in the SUNSMART initiative and a benefit.
 (2 marks)
- **Evaluate** how effective EACH Action Area is in addressing AND improving the health priority area targeted in the SUNSMART initiative. (12 marks)

PART B – Two questions completed during period 2 Tuesday 2nd April 2024. You will be allocated 25 mins.

SunSmart stimulus will be provided for you on the day of the assessment.

What actions are needed to address Australia's health priorities?

Students learn about:

- health promotion based on the five action areas of the Ottawa Charter
 - levels of responsibility for health promotion
 - the benefits of partnerships in health promotion, eg government sector, nongovernment agencies and the local community
 - how health promotion based on the Ottawa Charter promotes social justice
 - the Ottawa Charter in action

Students learn to:

- argue the benefits of health promotion based on:
 - individuals, communities and governments working in partnership
 - the five action areas of the Ottawa Charter
- investigate the principles of social justice and the responsibilities of individuals, communities and governments under the action areas of the Ottawa Charter
- critically analyse the importance of the five action areas of the Ottawa Charter through a study of TWO health promotion initiatives related to Australia's health priorities

SunSmart and the Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion



HOW THE SUNSMART PROGRAM REFLECTS THE OTTAWA
CHARTER FOR HEALTH PROMOTION PRIORITY AREAS

BUILD HEALTHY PUBLIC POLICY

- Campaigned for the ban on commercial solariums
- Advocated for shade and sun protection policies to be required by early childhood services
- Input into the Australian Standards for items such as clothing, sunglasses and sunscreen

CREATE SUPPORTIVE ENVIRONMENTS

- Advocating for shade in schools, early childhood services, workplaces and public places
 - e.g. advocating for the continuation of shade grants from the government
- Making information available for the public to make healthy choices
 - e.g. sun protection measures, how to check your skin
- Best practice advice and policy support for workplaces, schools and early childhood services

STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY ACTIONS

- Work collaboratively with SunSmart teams and Cancer Councils around Australia
 - e.g. sharing of resources, knowledge and having consistent messaging
- Actively working with and advocating to/for relevant stakeholders, for example:
 - Schools/early childhood/ tertiary organisations
 - Workplaces, particularly those who work outdoors
 - Health professionals
 - Government bodies
 - World Health Organization

DEVELOP PERSONAL SKILLS

- Awareness campaigns to increase the public's knowledge about UV and sun protection
- Free information on our website to help people to properly protect themselves and check their skin
- Education sessions for workplaces, tertiary organisations, schools and early childhood services

REORIENT HEALTH SERVICES

- Education workshops at conferences
- Resources for health professionals so they are able to provide best-practice recommendations to patients
 - Supporting general practitioners (GPs) to detect skin cancer earlier
