#### **Detailed Assessment Task Description**

### Section I (25 marks)

- There will be three short-answer questions.
- Questions may consist of parts.
- One guestion/part will be worth from 10 to 15 marks.

#### Section II (25 marks)

- There will be six extended response questions, two questions on each of practice, the conceptual framework and frames.
- Students will be required to answer one question.
- Keep in mind the expected length of a section II response for the HSC EXAMINATION should be approximately 1000 words. **Use your case study artists or other artists.**
