YEAR 7 Lesson on the Formal Elements : Space

Homework:

Create a complex 'negative space' drawing at home. (Repeat the exercise that we did in the class.)

Starter:

Show Powerpoint slides on Rachel Whiteread Question: how do you think Rachel Whiteread made the sculptures in the handout/on the Powerpoint? (introduce the idea of 'negative space') Show video on Rachel Whiteread's 'Ghost' Question: if you did the same with a drawing as Rachel Whiteread did with her house what would the drawing look like? Examine negative space drawings on the worksheet.

Modelling:

The teacher will draw on the board in front of the class an example of drawing using negative space, for example a drawing of a stool.

Group work:

Groups work in pairs to arrange objects, for example stools or whatever is available to the teacher, on the desk to make interesting overlapping compositions.

Individual work:


Students to make a negative space drawing of the objects they have arranged using charcoal or pencil on paper.

Plenary:


Discuss as a group/perhaps make a brainstorm on: What is negative space and is it important?

Rachel Whiteread is a living British artist who is interested in the **spaces** between, underneath, around, or inside ordinary everyday objects. She will often make these empty spaces solid using concrete or other materials.


Rachel Whiteread 'Ghost' 1990
